It stars a female traveler, a creepy motel, and a young man with a strange obsession with his mother-you can see where this is going. Watch Now Silence of the Lambs (1991) Starring Jodie Foster and Anthony Hopkins, this film will definitely give you your serial killer/psychopath fix. Hint: it's not really about lambs. Watch Now Get Out (2017) This Jordan Peele-written and directed feature explores the dark bottom of U.S. racial dynamics. When a white woman brings her black boyfriend home to meet her family, the innocent weekend trip quickly turns sour (to say the least). Watch Now Paranormal Activity (2007) The film that launched an entire genre of found movie shots, Paranormal is now horror canon. Cameras throughout the house capture footage of guess-paranormal activity. Watch Now Child's Game (1998) Child's Game launched the famed Chucky character, a creepy doll-turned-killer. This slasher was such a success that it spawned five sequels. Watch Now the Flash (1980) Here's Johnny! The Shining is a horror movie for centuries. Produced and directed by Stanley Kubrick and starring Jack Nicholson, the film chronicles the descent of Jack Torrence (Nicholson) into pure madness. Watch Now The Exorcist (1973) Do you ever suspect that the devil is trapped inside a loved one? I don't think so either. But that's the premise of The Exorcist, one of the most profitable horror films of all time. Watch Now Baby Rosemary (1968) A new, thriving New York couple is expecting their first child, but all is not as happy as it seems. The couple moves into an ominous building and Rosemary's pregnancy takes a dark turn. Watch Now the Conjuring (2013) What makes Conjuring particularly freaky is that it was based away from (supposedly) real events. The supernatural horror film follows two paranormal investigators helping a family living in a haunted mansion. Watch Now Saw (2004) A classic early 2000s low Horror movie, Saw is yet another serial killer-focused scary movie. Two men are trapped in the nest of a psychopath who needs to escape before the worst happens. Watch Now Us (2019) The same as Get Out (and also written and directed by Jordan Peele), the United States covers childhood traumas, creepy doppelgangers and murders. In addition, Lupita Nyong'o plays the lead role. Watch Now Midsommar (2019) Before Amy March, Florence Pugh Pugh in this popular horror movie. In Midsommar, a group of unsusited friends travel to Sweden, only to find themselves in the clutches of a sacrificial pagan cult. Watch Now Halloween (1978) If you're watching horror movies in honor of that scary holiday in October, look no further than the aptly named Halloween. The 1970s slasher film follows a young mentally illkiller who returns to his small town in search of revenge. Watch Now Friday 13 (1980) Another slasher movie, Friday the 13th is about a group of teenage summer camp counselors who are chased one by one by a mysterious killer. Be warned: things become gory. Watch Now The Invisible Man (2020) Based on H. G. Wells's 1897 novel, Invisible Man starred Elisabeth Moss as a woman trapped in an abusive relationship. When her boyfriend dies suddenly, Moss Cecilia's character knows that his loose ends are far from tied up. Watch Now Ring (2002) A remake of a cult favorite Japanese horror film, The Ring Is Not for the Faint of Heart. The film revolves around a damn videotape that kills anyone who watches it. This may not sound like the scariest premise you've ever heard, but believe us, leave a light on while watching it. Watch Now It (2017) Remember all this scary clown trend a few years ago? yes, that was the reason. Based on a Stephen King novel, this film will make you think twice about hiring clowns for your child's next birthday party. Watch Now Insidious (2010) Want another possessed child feature? You're in luck-Sneaky nails this kind. Even better, there are four movies in the franchise so you can really stay on topic. Watch Now the Blair Witch Project (1999) Few films have made as big of a mark on the horror genre as the Blair Witch Project. The film treats its events as true, and what the viewer sees, supposedly, is the material found the main characters left behind (dun dun dun). Watch Now The Purge (2013) This dystopian feature caused a lot of disruption at the time of its release. The film imagines a version of the United States where, for 12 hours at a time, all crimes are legal. You can see how things could go terribly wrong. You may be able to find more information about this and similar content in piano.io It's easy to make a bad movie, but a fascinating mix of merit, lack of judgment, ignorance of the technical and creative aspects of film production, all around bad taste and the inability to recognize any of these shortcomings to make a film so bad that it comes full circle and becomes enjoyable. Consider this Horror Movie Hall of Shame. What's that? A Z-grade sequel to the 1985 B-movie Biohazard about an evil company that creates an indestructible creature that naturally escapes and goes around killing people, yadda yadda yadda. What's so terribly bad about it? He's not an alien. He's a mutant. The plasma creature A drop kick away from a Power Rangers character. Throwing floppy disks in someone's face is as effective as hitting them with a brick. A car crash of 10 miles per hour causes the vehicles to burst into flames. Our hero's speech: I love football, and I'm going to fire this quarterback now. High/Lowlight: A woman inexplicably sculpts pottery while having sex. Dialogue Sample: Are you crazy? Don't die there! What's that? A self-proclaimed romantic thriller tribute to Alfred Hitchcock's birds. What's so terribly bad about it? Fascinating scenes of our hero driving to work and negotiating the price of a solar panel on his roof. Birds that make the sounds of the plane bombard diving and then explode into contact. A scene featuring 75 seconds of applause (with an audio loop). Eagles that can hover without waving their wings. Entire scenes without dialogue or meaningful action. A star that behaves as if it has emotional paralysis. High/Lowlight: Fighting off birds with coat hangers. Sample Dialogue: Hey, there are dead people on the side of the road. Let's go see if there are any survivors. What's that? No budget African-American food for a virginal, church-going woman who buys a cursed ventriloquist effigy that wants to have sex with her. What's so terribly bad about it? Did I mention that the doll wants to have sex with her? Did I mention the doll is having sex with her? And she likes it? It was shot on a video camera in the early 1980s. A Super Mario Bros.-esque Casio rating keyboard. A seven-minute opening credit sequence. A child was used as a double body in a movie about a doll rape. High/Lowlight: Nearby lights of the puppet's fully functional tongue, covered in what looks like soft-serve vanilla ice cream. Sample Dialogue: Now that you have smelled the stench of my breath, you can now taste the sweetness of my tongue! What's that? Italian horror film that is Piranha on a ship with amphibious fish that can breathe air and fly. What's so terribly bad about it? Ridiculous dubbed voices. Stupid characters who say lines like This should be a refrigerator and who think it's a good idea to try a mysterious white powder they find in a lab. The ship's self-destruct alarm says anyone's listening? I'm still listening to footsteps. Evacuate! Evacuate! Stop fooling around! Clayna! High/Lowlight: A woman lays thousands of fish eggs (administered, had sex with a mutant fish). Sample Dialogue: Professor, how long have you f***ing fish? (The answer: They were old enough!) © wonder pictures what are they? Unfortunately, it's not Die Hard with vampires. On the contrary, an American travels to the Czech Republic and ends up defending against Dracula. What's so terribly bad about it? The Czech locals all have American touches. No one suspects that the man walking with red lips and a person who is a vampire. Our heroes invade Dracula's castle four times and each time they end up running away. A sensual love scene suddenly cuts through the sounds of a bed rocking in The Nutcracker. Tchaikovsky's Trepak (Russian Dance). Dracula visits a dentist. High/Lowlight: Dracula flies through the air while still in his coffin, to the tune Ride of the Valkyries. Sample Dialogue: I'm An American, and we're tough! © Urban Works What is it? Rapper Master P's attempt at a horror movie with his son Romeo about a murder victim returning for revenge. What's so terribly bad about it? The 40-year-old Master P plays a student. Extras look straight at the camera on more than one occasion. Entire scenes of dialogue are drowned out by general hip-hop music. It's 44 minutes, including credits. There are seven minutes of video of Master P walking through some cheesy amusement park haunted house attraction. A victim dies from being locked in the shower. High/Lowlight: A sess brings to mind Michael Jackson... Three years before he died. (Cue the pedophile jokes.) Sample Dialogue: Looks like it's straight from the hood or something. © Dark Sky What is it? Cold War-era fare for an American android astronaut (Frank) is battling Martians looking to reproduce with the women of Earth. What's so terribly bad about it? Space Star is a word. The dandy Martian villain looks like a discarded caricature of Mike Myers. Spacey's a guy in a gorilla costume with a rubber monster mask. The Martians have a machine that seems to say whether women are virgins or not. The scenes alternate randomly between day and night. Material material! High/Lowlight: In the midst of searching for Frank and stopping an invasion of Mars, our heroes take sights on a Vespa. Sample dialog: This is a clear case of failure. What's that? Walker, Texas Ranger-era Chuck Norris plays a cop battling an ancient demon with only his fists, legs, and beard. What's so terribly bad about it? Norris's character's name is Frank Shattered. Shatter seems to be shopping for clothes at Don Johnson's sales. The police chief who's used to Hollywood yelling that Shatter is a loose cannon. Hollywood-standard black sidekick comic relief. The demonic villain has Kermit the Frog's eyes. High/Lowlight: Smash his gun recklessly in the air, then fight a criminal who is already in custody because he can. Sample Dialogue: Eat this! What's that? Abyssus sequel to beloved werewolf film The Howling in which a werewolf hunter (a very perplexing Christopher Lee) travels to Europe to track down the werewolf queen. What's so terribly bad about it? If you remove a silver bullet from a werewolf during the autopsy, the werewolf re-ezops. Christopher Lee blends into a punk nightclub wearing sunglasses and Werewolves do more than have 300,000. Dwarves handling a mic! The werewolf queen shoots lightning from her fingers. Werewolf makeup is shag carpets and plastic fangs. High/Lowlight: Hero Ben tosses a dwarf out of a window. Dialogue Sample: He's planning to destroy me, but I'm going to destroy him! What's that? A cheap feature for a holiday family that a violent and disturbing cult. What's so terribly bad about it? Endless scenes driving past landscape. Twitchy, limping caretaker Torgo talks like Twiki with you out of here. What's that? The sfty sequel to Mega Shark vs. Giant Octopus, about genetically modified piranha set-shocker-to get out of hand. (Mega Shark may have gotten more guy, but for my money, Mega Piranha has more poor movie entertainment value.) What's so terribly bad about it? '80s pop singer Tiffany stars as a genetics teacher. Barry Greg Brady Williams plays the Secretary of State.Stiff CGI critters who move their tails, the only thing tougher is Tiffany's action. Fish launched to earth to kill people... Then proceed to death. There's a steel hero who's a combination between Jean-Claude Van Damme and a telephone pole. High/Lowlight: The bike-kicking scene. Sample Dialogue: This just got real! What's that? Long considered by many to be the de facto worst film ever, this notorious attempt by cult director Ed Wood finds aliens trying to take over the Earth by aneming the dead bodies-at least three of them. What's so terribly bad about it? The pompous narrative that has to explain what happens in each scene. Flying saucers hang on the strings. UFOs are described as cigar-shaped when they are clearly saucers. Bela Lugosi died during production, and his stand-in is trying to mask his identity by holding a Dracula cape in front of his face. High/Lowlight: The foppish alien leader throwing a whistling fit: Your stupid mind! Silly! Stupid! Sample dialogue: Future events like these will affect you in the future. What's that? David DeCoteau's homoerotic horror picture brings us this story of an undead boy band looking for a new singer. What's so terribly bad about it? People try out for the LIP SYNC singer at auditions. Dated (even in '04) boy band performances were cut into scenes that have nothing to do with them performing. Thinly veiled homoerism. Ryan Starr's muttering performance is even worse than her song. Von Dutch product placements! They are the largest group in the world, but they only have one song, which repeat ad pauseum. High/Lowlight: A 2-minute, 25-second scene of band members walking together without explanation or any action. Sample For someone in the music industry, you're pretty easily fooled. What's that? Blame Canada for this entry by rocker Jon Miki Thor for a band rehearsing in a house that is a gateway to hell. What's so terribly bad about it? What better way to start a movie than with a four-minute driving montage? A character character called Roger Ebur!Not-so-subtle pro-Canada bias: Toronto where it happens, man: the music, the film industry, the arts! Satan's Ultimate Weaponry: Starfish Play-Doh. High/Lowlight: Our hero films in his studded skin codpiece for the Battle of Satan. Sample Dialogue: There is the highest law of a creator that keeps you in your dark place, and yet you and your brothers still insist on coming into this world and trying to steal a place in the world of the living. When are you going to find out? What's that? Robocop meets Maniac Cop meets Frankenstein, as an experimental android cop named R.O.T.O.R. goes on a murder spree. What's so terribly bad about it? Our hero is a Clint Eastwood-type wannabe named Aaron Coldryon (Cold Iron).R.O.T.O.R. looks like Tron Guy.Punches who miss by two feet. Random kung fu! 80s style: Mullets! Scapula! Raw racial stereotypes! Lame attempts at comedy, courtesy of a whiny police robot that is Johnny a poor man 5 by short circuit.R.O.T.O.R.R. weakness: car horns? High/Lowlight: R.O.T.O.R. engages in hand-to-hand combat with a muscle-bound, skunk-haired she-man that appears in the last 15 minutes. Sample Dialogue: To combat pure willpower, you need to use pure illogic. What's that? Before any mega sharks hit SyFy, there was Megalodon, a name-only sequel to a prehistoric shark that makes the other Shark Attack movies look like jaws. What's so terribly bad about it? The roar of the shark. Many of the actors seem to be learning English in flight. Ridiculous special effects that are the cinematic equivalent of clipping and pasting. Random inappropriate laughter during the dialogue. The fin of the Papier-mâché shark. A giant shark attacks your yacht, so you decide to jump in the water? Possibly the single worst line ever pronounced in a movie (see below). High/low lighting: Shark smorgasbord. Sample Dialogue: How about I take you home and eat p*****? What's that? This unrelated Italian-produced sequel to the 1986 film Troll-- in which a vacationing family falls victim to creatures who want to turn them into vegetables and eat them -- has received such a cult following that it has its own documentary, titled Best Worst Movie. What's so terribly bad about it? There are no trolls. Just elves. Vegetarian cannibals? Continuity problems (Dad's shirt is open, then closed, then open) Halloween shop goblin masks don't have animated mouths, so how can they eat anything? None of the family members are wary of people trying to force them to feed them in green. Oh gaaaaaawwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwwd!!! The elves are leaving a sandwich with alafudia. Sample Dialog: You can't pee in hosting! What's that? An unintentional (:) campy remake of the famous 1973 British thriller about a policeman searching for a missing girl in an isolated pagan community. What's so terribly bad about it? Nicholas Cage's manic appearance. Our hero threatens young children, hits two women in the face and karate kicks Leelee Sobieski in the next week. In addition, it finds the decomposed decomposed a man with his mouth sewn and his eyes and hand eaten by animals and proceeds to shake him to see if he is still alive. High/low lighting: BEAR. Match. Sample Dialogue: Killing Me Won't Bring Back Your Damn Honey! Honey!

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
